Colwyn Bay, Wales, United Kingdom Tuesday, May 10, 2016

Shortcuts make delays but inns make longer ones - J.R.R. Tolkien

Sunday 8th of May 2016

The sunny weather continues as we make our way north A long part of this route is along narrow county roads with houses right on the edge of the bitumen with 60 mile per hour traffic one metre outside their front door. We did go part of the way on a motorway by mistake - with no exit or option to do a 'U' turn for about 15 miles. Luckily the nice lady in the GPS was able to re-calculate an alternative route and we found our way to Ironbridge, Shropshire. This is a beautiful place. It's hard to imagine it in its heyday with foundries, mines, quarries, factories and other industries lining the Severn River. Now it is just a picture of beauty. This place is definitely on our list of places needing further investigation in the future. The centerpiece is the iron bridge, the first constructed by a new method of smelted cast iron. It's said that this town was the the birthplace of the industrial revolution. This area is also the former home of Coalport china. The old china factory has been renovated and is of a classic Victorian era design. We found a nice little bakery to get some lunch - and had the best pork pie and sausage roll we have ever had.

Onwards to Old South Wales. The countryside continues to be very pleasant. We make better time now as the roads are more like main roads - but there seems to be a round-a-bout to negotiate every couple of miles. Before too long we're in North Wales and spy the Irish Sea. We head along the coast on a motorway then diverge at Colwyn to head up the hill to our accommodation at Llanelian-yn-Rhos at the Old Post Office. This is a real village - only 18 houses and a pub. We had to wait a little while for the caretaker to arrive to let us in so we struck up a conversation with Paul from over the road - an ex-olympic and professional bicycle racer. We got his life story before Haley arrived with the keys. We are very pleased with this place. Small but comfortable and well appointed - and a steep, narrow staircase leading up to the bedroom and bathroom. It is indeed the old post office, with the official post office box in the front wall still in use. We had dinner at the White Lion pub over the road. 233 miles. Weather fine 25 degrees.

Monday 9th of May 2016

We are feeling the effects of being on the road and having very full days so far. Both of us are tired and we decided to have a quieter day today. Well that was the plan. We headed down to the seaside at Colwyn Bay and strolled along the pier at Llandudno. Anna purchased a nice doughnut from a friendly vendor on the pier, but only got to consume about one third before a vicious seagull swooped down and stole the rest out of the paper bag in her hand before flying off squawking triumphantly. We decided to have fish and chips on the beach for lunch, keeping a wary eye on the sky, monitoring the seagulls circling above. We got to eat all of our lunch without becoming victims of another crime.

After lunch we drove along the coast road then climbed up to the summit of the Great Orme. The view from the summit is spectacular, overlooking the Irish Sea and Llandudno below. Had a quiet meal at The Old Post Office and a relaxing evening at home. 20 miles. Weather fine 23 degrees.

Tuesday 10th of May 2016

The weather is a little overcast this morning as we headed off to tour the North Wales are including Snowdonia National Park. We drove along some very narrow hedge / stone wall lined roads - narrowly avoiding head-on collisions with crazy Audi drivers coming from the opposite direction. We stopped at Betwys-y-Coed to walk the path to Miners Bride. Magical scenery. This is the base for a lot of ramblers (bush walkers) and we saw a lot of people in pants with zip off legs and fancy walking sticks. We continued on via Blaenau Ffestiniog with its giant hills of discarded slate to Harlech to see our first Welsh castle. One had cause to hum "Men of Harlech in the hollow do ye hear like rushing billow... ...Loose the folds asunder, flag we conquer under", while eating a picnic lunch in a beachside carpark in the shadow of the castle.

We continued on our tour of North Wales via Porthmadog (intended to see Beddgelent but had an argument with the GPS - I was sure she was lost) to Caenarfon. Now that town has a castle. Puts the Harlech one to shame. We took a break here for a coffee and ice-cream and walked around the castle and wall next to Slate Quay. Just as we got back to the car, the rain started - the first since we've been in the UK. Back home for a home cooked meal while we still can - bed and breakfasts from here for a while. There's a jazz night at the White Lion tonight. I'm not really a fan of jazz, but as it's just over the road, we might visit for Anna to have half a pint and listen to the music. 124 miles. 18 degrees with rain starting in the afternoon.
